Improved Monitoring:

Using satellite imagery and remote sensing technologies allows us to monitor mangrove health and detect illegal activities.

Better management:

Local and traditional knowledge is important to understand what can work in a local context for long-term success. Mangrove protection and conservation is most successful when local communities are directly involved in the management.

Restoration:

Prioritising natural rehabilitation of mangroves whenever possible. Any planting effort to restore degraded areas should focus on a variety of native species found in the local area.

Ecotourism:

Promoting environmentally friendly tourism – such as guided tours, kayaking or stand-up paddleboarding – educates visitors about the vital role of mangroves.
